
NORTH YORK MOORS NATIONAL PARK NMP The White Horse of Kilburn











Cut into the south face of an Iron Age promontory fort at Roulston Scar, the White Horse of Kilburn is the largest hill figure in Britain, visible from over 30 km away.

The monument has been mapped as part of the North York Moors
National Park National Mapping
Programme (NMP) by Archaeological
Research Services Ltd. The historic
aerial photography reveals a story of
conservation and camouflage.

businessman to emulate a prehistoric hill figure, the horse is cut into unstable grey limestone that requires regular maintenance. In the early twentieth century the monument fell into disrepair. It was restored in 1925 through a public subscription fund initiated by the Yorkshire Evening Post. Regular restoration is now funded by bodies such as English Heritage.

Roulston Scar is also the home of the Yorkshire Gliding Club, founded in 1933. The club was used for training in the inter-war years by the British and Germans alike, hence during the Second World War the monument had to be camouflaged to impede navigation using this well known landmark.

Historic aerial photography reveals that repair over the years has gradually modified the shape: seen in the enlargement of the head and shortening of the tail and legs.
